Making Robotics a National Movement

A seed was planted in the mind of Nurdaulet Dosmagambet as he listened to Dean Kamen's speech at the inaugural 2017 *FIRST* Global Challenge in Washington, DC. He was inspired by Dean's words to go back to his country of Kazakhstan and take on the responsibility of spreading this experience to many more youth, especially in rural areas.

Five years later, his organization hosted the largest-to-date national robotics competition in Kazakhstan. Supported by the Minister of Education and Science, they engaged more than 10,000 students across the country, including 3,000 girls. Twenty-two teams competed in the final championship, including a team of Uygher students who were the youngest in attendance and new to robotics, yet placed 5th.

"The most interesting thing for me is that we don't usually get this many students at any competitions in Kazakhstan," says student Zhantore, whose team won first place and moved on to represent their country in Geneva. "Robotics and these kinds of competitions are something I'm really passionate about, and being able to share this passion with so many new students that are from my own home country is a special feeling."

Despite reaching such an impressive milestone, Nurdaulet is as committed as ever to expand their efforts and reach even more kids. "We have put our best efforts to make *FIRST* Global more accessible to students in Kazakhstan and Central Asia," he says. "We genuinely feel that the talented and gifted students are in the rural areas, especially because of their hunger for the knowledge, the new technology. If we could deliver the opportunities that *FIRST* Global gives to the students, I genuinely believe they could achieve far more, they could be really beneficial for the whole world."

Kazakhstan isn't the only country developing national competitions at this scale. Other partners that have helped expand the impact of *FIRST* Global to tens of thousands of students this year include Angola, Bolivia, Colombia, Denmark, Guatemala, Libya, Malaysia, Slovakia, Venezuela, and Vietnam.





FIRST Global Challenge



Carbon Capture in Geneva, Switzerland

The 2022 theme of *Carbon Capture* highlighted the importance of capturing and storing carbon dioxide (CO_2) to reduce and prevent its accumulation in the atmosphere. Teams learned about the impact of CO_2 on our environment and the technologies being developed and already in place to ensure the safety of our planet through the future. In the game, six national teams worked together as a single global alliance to capture and store carbon, demonstrating the collective effort required to protect our shared atmosphere. They then divided into two regional alliances to employ local solutions to achieve effective long-term storage methods and slow the effects of climate change.

The New Technology Experience (NTE)

The New Technology Experience: *Carbon Countermeasures*, hosted in partnership with XPRIZE, guided teams in learning about climate change, the impact of CO₂ on our environment, and developing their own innovative solutions to combat it. The gold, silver, and bronze medal winners were Zimbabwe, Indonesia, and Greece, respectively.

The Skills Challenge

The Skills Challenge consisted of actions a robot performs in the course of playing *Carbon Capture*, and was an opportunity for each team to show off their robot's abilities, whether they attended the event in-person or participated remotely. The gold, silver, and bronze medal winners were People's Republic of China, Uzbekistan, and Moldova, respectively.





Empowering Young Women

For many girls, their participation is just the beginning of a longer-term effort to empower their communities. As part of sharing their experiences with other young women, teams such as Comoros, Ghana, and Uganda have planned community initiatives to pass on their knowledge. For example, Team Comoros 2022 created a 6-month program called "Girls STEAM'ING" with the vision to create the very first STEM clubs in different schools in Comoros. As the team stated, they want "to spark hope in our girls and show them that they, too, have a seat at the STEAM table." The program is hybrid and started with 25 students from five different schools attending a weeklong STEAM bootcamp. As each team goes back to their school, they'll create a STEAM club, teach their classmates the different skills they acquired, and participate in challenges and mentorship offered by the 2022 Team Comoros. In June 2023, they plan to host an exhibition of all of the work accomplished alongside a scaled FIRST Global Challenge national competition.

FIRST Global is important because it creates a platform for girls and boys in technology from all over the world to come together to solve the world's problems. It fosters a sense of creativity, innovation, and cooperation needed to unite us. This experience has made my love for STEM grow beyond words. A love I want to share with my community in various ventures I aim to carry out.

From India's Slums to the Robotics World Stage

In India, more than six million kids drop out of school every year. Out of every 100, 29 don't even get the opportunity to complete elementary education.

By providing these youth with opportunities to realize their potential, we are able to change this. Team India 2022 is a perfect example. Composed of five students from different government schools, they all come from underprivileged backgrounds living in urban slums.

The FIRST Global partner in India first met the kids who would soon form Team India when distributing laptops to underprivileged children. They then enrolled in the organization's Digital Literacy program, and were soon training in robotics for the FIRST® Tech Challenge regionals in India.

Selected separately for the *FIRST* Global team, they didn't really know each other, but soon became close as they expanded their skill sets in coding, mechanics, and even English. Despite traveling around two hours to the workshop space, they saw their school grades improve as they focused on their academics and learned to manage their time.

"This experience has opened up a plethora of possibilities, opportunities and life-goals for these students," says team mentor Meenal, acknowledging that now they all want to pursue degrees in engineering.

No one in their families had ever even had a passport, let alone flown out of the country. They were the first. And while the idea of representing India on the world stage would have seemed like a fairytale just a few months ago, they did just that and placed in the top 30 in Geneva.

"I hope that children like me never stop dreaming," says team member Sumit. "It has been a magical experience for me. Now I feel everything is possible."

The XRP robots are simple, inexpensive, easy to build, just as programmable as a far more expensive robot, and come with built-in educational support, enabling broader implementation and expansion of robotics programs around the world. All *FIRST* Global teams in Geneva were provided with a free XRP robot to take back to their home countries for this purpose.


